



**Directions**: Read *The House on Mango Street* by Sandra Cisneros and complete the assignment below while following the instructions carefully. All components must be included in your final product.

Sandra Cisneros tells her readers that she decided to write her novel because "You will always be Mango Street. You can't erase what you know. You can't forget who you are." The purpose of this project is to create your **own** book, which will help you remember what you know as well as show others who you are.

#### Your book must have the following items:

- 1. An original cover with title 10 points
- 3. Dedication 5 points
- 4. Table of contents 5 points
- 5. Written in the same style as Cisneros 25 points
- 6. 4 Chapters that follow the guidelines 55 points

#### **Total: 100 points**

You should mimic the author's style in your writing. <u>Include figurative language</u>, incorporate symbols, and vary <u>your syntax</u>. **Don't just write a summary.** Look at how Sandra Cisneros uses creative writing to convey meaning and use that as your model for each of your chapters.

#### Your chapters must be chosen from the following subjects:

- Your neighborhood
- Games or favorite toys from your childhood
- A time you got into trouble
- A time you saw someone else get into trouble

- Advice from an adult
- A positive story from your experiences at school
- A negative story from your experiences at school
- A special family member
- A happy time for you
- A special holiday
- A special birthday
- The Big Game
- A birth
- One additional chapter on anything you wish

**Chapter Length**: Each chapter should be at least <sup>3</sup>/<sub>4</sub> to 1 page typed. If your chapter is shorter than that, it will not receive full credit. Your chapters can be in any order you choose as long as they follow your table of contents.






